Six Women Heroes of Passover

Rabbi Stephen Lewis Fuchs

Passover will soon be here! Cantor Kelly will lead a Women's Seder on April 2, and our Congregational Seder will be on April 13. I hope many of you are planning to attend.



Sociologists tell us that more Jews will participate in some form of Passover Seder than will participate in any other religious event during the year!

One of the points I have stressed at Shabbat Torah Study where we have been studying the Exodus from Egypt (and we would love to have you join our growing group) is:

We cannot really appreciate the meaning and message of Passover without recognizing the importance of no fewer than SIX women!

From a religious perspective, the Exodus from Egypt enabled all subsequent Jewish history to unfold. Without Passover we would still be slaves in Egypt! Moses, of course is G-d's agent in the liberation and the story's foremost hero. The Book of Exodus, however, makes it clear that the role six women play in that event is crucial. Without them, the Exodus could not have taken place, and we would have no Passover to celebrate!

Shiphrah and Puah

Shiphrah and Puah were humble midwives. Pharaoh ordered them to kill every baby boy that emerged from his mother's womb. The most powerful man on earth – one worshipped as a god — gave them a direct order! The midwives, though, answered to a higher authority than Pharaoh. Their bravery rings across the millennia as an answer to those Nazis' who claimed they had no choice but to kill Jews because, "They were only following orders." Shiphrah and Puah teach us we always have a choice. (Exodus 1:15-21) The highest authority to which we answer is not a powerful person but our own conscience.

Yocheved

Yocheved, Moses' mother, hid her baby in defiance of Pharaoh's decree. Then she placed him in a wicker basket and floated him among the reeds of the Nile. What courage that took, but her gamble paid off! (Exodus 2:1-3) Moses survived

Miriam

Miriam, Moses' sister watched the basket from afar. When Pharaoh's daughter drew it out of the water, Miriam, with perfect timing, runs to her and suggests the baby's own mother as its nurse. In so doing she saved her brother's life. (Exodus 2:4-9)

Pharaoh's Daughter

The heroic role of Pharaoh's daughter also should not escape our attention. She defied her father's decree and saved Moses. For this she received the privilege of giving Moses' his name, and our Sages give her the name *Bit-yah*, which means "daughter of the Lord." (*Va-yikra Rabbah* 1:3; B, Megillah 13A). (Exodus 2:5-10)

Life is a roller coaster. There are some really great highs in life, so great that we wish we can stay up there forever. And there are some really deep lows in life, so low that we think we are never going to get out. But most of life is made up of the small ups and downs. The one thing life never is, is a straight smooth line. It is one of those smaller lows I want to talk about because I think it is something many of us experience but maybe don't or aren't able to do anything about.

I found out that an acquaintance of mine was very angry with me and had been for quite some time. I was not supposed to find this out and I was asked not to say anything to the person who was angry. In Judaism we learn that if we transgress against someone that before we can be forgiven by G-d, we must first ask for forgiveness from the person we transgressed against. We should try to make amends at least three times and hope to be forgiven. But what do you do when you can't make it right? Do you try anyway? What if you know by trying to make amends to one person you will hurt another person?

Our Rabbis' are pretty clear, that if you know you have transgressed you need to try to make amends, but if it is truly impossible, then you need to recognize your mistake and do your best to repent and change your ways so you do not make the same mistake again, and then you just need to let it go. We cannot control another person. Even when we can ask for forgiveness, the other person may not forgive.

There is a part of me that wants to be angry with the people involved because they are taking away my opportunity to make amends. But then I think about the person who is angry. They have been carrying this anger for some time, and I am truly sorry for that. I truly hope that as time goes by, they might get to a place where they will be willing to talk with me and if not, I hope that they are able to move past their anger. It is also worth noting that anger at others, even when merited, can be personally destructive. In Lev. 19:18 it says, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself". This verse is preceded by, "you shall not bear a grudge." Bearing a grudge has been likened to drink poison, it gnaws away at us, embittering the life of the person holding a grudge. Forgiving your neighbors is one way of loving them and learning to love yourself.

I am a firm believer in owning up to my mistakes and asking for forgiveness when I have hurt someone and not being able to do that is very difficult. Over these next months before Yom Kippur, I am going to do my best to let this go, so when I pray on Yom Kippur for G-d's forgiveness, G-d will know that in my heart I have repented, and I hope G-d will forgive me.

For all of you, if you are holding on to anger for someone and have not given them the opportunity to make amends, try and give them that opportunity. It will be better for both of you. If you have transgressed against someone, try and make amends. Love your neighbor as yourself! Remember, we must do the work so G-d can forgive.

Zipporah

The final female hero of Passover is Zipporah, Moses' wife. She circumcised their son Eleazar when apparently Moses had neglected to do so. The passage really does not fit into the flow of the story, so the rabbis could have interpreted it any way they wished. They could have deemed it crucial or inconsequential. They chose to teach us that G-d would have killed Moses had Zipporah not intervened and circumcised their son! (Exodus 4:24-26).

The heroism of the women who made Passover possible is a strong and accurate answer to those who claim that women always play a subordinate role in Jewish thinking. The heroic women of Passover also provide wonderful role models for girls and women today to admire and emulate.

The role of women in our Passover celebration far transcends the kitchen. Without them, the liberation from slavery that Passover celebrates, never would have occurred.




